WATER


Some of our houses use a lot of water. Most people have washing machines to wash their clothes, and many people now have dishwashers to do all the washing up. These machines use gallons of water. We also use a lot of water when we have showers, baths and flush lavatories.

All the water we use in our homes and schools comes from rainwater in the first place. The rain that falls fills the rivers and lakes. Rainwater trickles down through the ground and fills wells and underground springs. With all the water we use in our homes, we need plenty of rain!

We need water to drink as well as for our machines. The water in the rivers or lakes is not clean or safe enough to drink. The water that comes to our houses has to be cleaned and made safe for us to drink and use for cooking.

To make water safe, it is pumped from the rivers or lakes and kept in a reservoir. A reservoir is a specially made lake. The water goes into the reservoir through a screen. This screen is like a net and traps all the leaves, twigs and branches that may be floating in the water.

The water then trickles down through layers of sand and gravel. Any tiny plants and bits that are still in the water are left behind. The water that trickles through is now quite clean. Chlorine is added to kill any germs that may be in the water. Now the water is safe for us to drink.



Why not try creating some of your own at home out of tin foil. The picture shows some figures created by my old class. The children then drew the shadows of their sculptures.





The Frog








The best time of the year for looking at frogs is in the






The tadpole lives in the water. Its **long tail** helps it to swim. It has **gills** on the side of its head and it breathes through these while in the water. As the tadpole grows older, hind legs appear and a short time later the front legs appear. Bit by bit the tail disappears and two or three months after it was hatched, the tadpole becomes a tiny frog. As the frog grows, its **lungs** begin to form so that it can breathe on land.



The frog lives in **damp** grass. It has smooth, moist skin and bulging eyes and it can hop up to 60cm — up to six or seven times its own length.



The frog eats worms, insects, spiders, moths and slugs. The frog traps many insects by catching them on its long **sticky tongue**.





Frogs can live for up to fifteen years, but they have many enemies and most frogs are killed long before they reach that age. Their main enemies are herons, eels, hedgehogs, owls, thrushes and blackbirds.
