Good Practice

Punctuality:

It is important that we are all on time for school. It is understandable that we can be occasionally late, but it is not good practice to be consistently late. It can be very upsetting for children and can impact negatively on the rest of the day. Sometimes, it can be difficult to get children out on time and their behaviour might be telling us something. If it's an issue for you come and talk to us.

Healthy Eating: One small treat on Friday.

WOW and WOF: Walk when you can, park away from the school

Road Safety: Promote the safe cross code and be sure that your child knows how to cross at the pedestrian crossing.

Attendance: Good attendance promotes learning and friendships

Homework: Please read the policy. We do not want homework to impact negatively on your evening.

Reading: Please make reading a priority- read to your child or have your child read to you.

Mobile phones: There is an increasing number of young children bringing a mobile phone to school. This is not something that we encourage. Even though we collect them in the mornings, we are not taking responsibility for them. We are merely trying to minimise distractions. Should a phone go missing, we will not be following up on it. We recommend that mobiles be left at home, except in exceptional circumstances.

Screen Time

The findings of the Growing Up In Ireland (2013) show that:

- Higher levels of educational achievement were associated with less screen time
- There was a clear relationship between the amount of screen time and the BMI status of the 5 year olds
- A child's behavioural difficulties was linked to long periods of 'screen-time' (television, video games or on the internet).
